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To the Voters of the City of Flagstaff:

This information pamphlet provides you with information regarding the City of Flagstaff's General Election of November 3, 2020, in which voters will select a mayor and three councilmembers, as well as a Special Election to consider a proposition proposed by the Flagstaff City Council. The pamphlet has been printed in both English and Spanish. To request a Spanish version, contact the City Clerk's Office at (928) 213-2076.

This election will be held in conjunction with the statewide election. You may vote prior to the election date using early voting procedures or in person on the day of the election at your polling place. To cast your vote in person, make sure that you go to the address of the precinct in which you are registered or one of the Vote Centers in Coconino County. Vote Centers are an alternative to the traditional precinct-assigned polling place. Voters from any precinct in the County may vote at one of the Vote Centers regardless of their residential address. The mailing label on this pamphlet will tell you your assigned precinct. The polls will open at 6:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

In order to be prepared to fully exercise your right to vote on November 3, 2020, you are urged to thoroughly read all the material contained within the pamphlet. Please keep in mind that questions may be printed on both sides of the actual ballot and candidate names may appear in a different order.

*The information provided in this document reflects the best information available to the City of Flagstaff at the time of its preparation. The descriptions of future programs and expenditures are based on currently available information and expectations. All such programs and expenditures are subject to future decisions and actions of the City Council. As such, the actual future programs and expenditures may vary from the descriptions herein. **The actual ballot language, of any ballot proposition that is approved, is legally binding on the future actions of the City Council, and no monies may be expended except for the purposes described in such ballot.***

I never received my ballot, what do I do?

If you did not receive a ballot, your voter registration information could be wrong. If you did not receive your ballot, contact the Coconino County Elections Office at www.coconino.az.gov/elections or call (928) 679-7860 to verify your voter registration information and receive instruction on how to obtain a replacement ballot.

I've received my ballot in the mail, now what do I do?

Once you have received your ballot, read all the instructions carefully. Fill out your ballot in BLACK ink. Then, place your voted ballot in the return envelope, sign the envelope, and drop it in the mail. The return envelope is self-addressed and the return postage has been pre-paid for you.

If you do not want to mail your ballot, you can drop it in one of the ballot drop box locations. For a list of ballot drop off locations please refer to the Coconino County Elections website at www.coconino.az.gov/elections or call (928) 679-7860. The deadline to drop off your early ballot is 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.



PROPOSITION NO. 436

CONTINUATION OF 1% GENERAL TRANSACTION PRIVILEGE TAX (SALES TAX)

SUMMARY ANALYSIS

(For more information see Frequently Asked Questions below)

The City currently has a combined Transaction Privilege Tax (Sales Tax) rate of 2.281%, excluding a tax on food for home consumption (groceries). The general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) is imposed on the gross income received from engaging in taxable business activities in the City, as set forth in the Model City Tax Code (Chapter 3-05 of the City Code) and state law. The combined transaction privilege tax (sales tax) rate includes a 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) rate that was first adopted in 1964. This tax is currently set to expire in November 2024.

The 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) is a tax rate that generates revenues for the City of Flagstaff general operations (the General Fund). Although commonly referred to as a sales tax, this is actually a tax on the privilege of doing business in the taxing jurisdiction (the City in this case).

The transaction privilege tax (sales tax), in general, applies to the gross income from taxable activities, including but not limited to advertising, amusements, construction contracting, job printing, hotels, rental and licensing of real property (commercial), rental and licensing of personal property, restaurants and bars, retail sales excluding a tax on food for home consumption, telecommunications, and utility services. Each category of taxable activities is subject to tax exemptions, deductions, and/or credits as established by the State Legislature, the Model City Tax Code Commission, or by the City. The Arizona Department of Revenue is responsible for licensing all businesses subject to state or local transaction privilege tax (sales tax) and is responsible for collection of all transaction privilege tax (sales tax).

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Questions about Proposition 436 – Continuation of 1% General Transaction Privilege Tax (Sales Tax)

How much revenue does the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) raise for the City?

For the 2019-2020 fiscal year, the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) generated approximately \$20,600,000 in revenues for the General Fund, which is approximately 33% of the City's General Fund revenues.

How is the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) revenue spent?

All of the tax revenues from the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) rate go directly to the City's General Fund and are used to pay for core services. The General Fund pays for governmental services such as police, fire, recreation, parks, administration, community development, open space, housing, and some climate action programs.

Why does a continuation of the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) require voter approval?

The Flagstaff City Charter requires voter approval of transaction privilege tax (sales tax) rates. The current 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) rate was only approved by voters for a limited period and will expire in November 2024 unless it is continued. If voters approve Proposition No. 436, the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) will be continued through June 30, 2035.

What happens if the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) is not renewed?

The loss of the transaction privilege tax (sales tax) would result in the elimination of \$20,600,000 of the City's General Fund revenues beginning in fiscal year 2024-2025. The loss would require that significant cuts be made to the City's

budget, particularly General Fund programs and services listed in a prior question. The City Council would have to decrease services, increase fees, and/or raise property taxes at corresponding or lesser levels to compensate for the loss of general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) revenues.

Because the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax) rate funds core services, if Proposition No. 436 is not approved, the City Council may consider submitting a similar ballot question to the voters for consideration at the November 2022 general election.

What business activities are not subject to the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax)?

As a general rule, services are not subject to transaction privilege tax (sales tax). The City exempts some taxable categories such as the sale of food for home consumption (groceries), and residential rentals from tax. Public schools and non-profit entities may also receive preferential tax treatment. Are there other City transaction privilege taxes (sales taxes)?

Yes. Flagstaff voters have approved a variety of transaction privilege taxes (sales taxes) over the years, and dedicated revenues from these tax rates for specific purposes (transportation projects and transit services). When these tax rates are combined with the 1% general transaction privilege tax (sales tax), the combined Flagstaff transaction privilege tax (sales tax) tax rate is 2.281%. There is an additional 2% transaction privilege tax (sales tax) rate that applies only to hotels, restaurants and bars. This is also known as bed, board and beverage or "BBB" tax.

None of these other transaction privilege tax (sales tax) rates will be affected by this proposition.

How does our tax rate compare to other cities?

Do I pay transaction privilege tax (sales tax)?

The businesses engaged in taxable business activities are responsible for paying transaction privilege (sales) taxes. Businesses may choose to "pass through" the taxes to their customers.

Does anyone other than Flagstaff citizens pay this tax?

Yes. All people engaged in taxable activities in the City collect or pay City transaction privilege tax (sales tax). This includes tourists, people living in outlying areas, and people with second homes in Flagstaff.

ARGUMENTS FOR PROPOSITION NO. 436
